Why bother to spell properly?

Spelling matters because...

- Correct spelling is easier to read and understand.
- It creates a positive image about the writer – intelligent, knowledgeable, has attention to detail and cares about his or her written word.
- The writing is more credible and the subject matter is likely to be taken more seriously.
- Spelling correctly sets a good example for others and encourages them to maintain high standards for themselves.

Spelling Rules for English (1)

achieve believe chief friend grieve hygiene

But

ceiling conceit deceive perceive receipt

So the rule: *i* before *e* except after *c*

beige freight weight neighbour vein

And, *e* before *i* in words rhyming with 'hey'

Exceptions to the rule include:

ancient caffeine either neither foreign height
leisure weird seize

Spelling Rules for English (2)

ride + ing = riding
surprise + ing = surprising
hope + ing = hoping

But

like + ness = likeness
entire + ly = entirely

And

true + ly = truly
argue + ment = argument

So the rule: drop the final *e* when adding an ending that begins with a vowel; keep the final *e* if the ending begins with a consonant; drop the final *e* if the word is preceded by a vowel.

Spelling Rules for English (3)

supply + es = supplies

baby + es = babies

try + es = tries

But

try + ing = trying

study + ing = studying

And

obey + ed = obeyed

So the rule: change *y* to *i* when adding an ending; keep the *y* if the ending is *-ing* and if there is a vowel before the *y*.

Spelling Rules for English (4)

paper + s = papers

flower + s = flowers

box + es = boxes

brush + es = brushes

But

company + es = companies

And

Sunday + s = Sundays

So the rule: to make a word plural add *s*, or *es*; if the word ends in consonant + *y*, change the *y* to *i* and add *-es*; keep the *y* on plural proper nouns.

Spelling Rules for English (5)

admit + ed = admitted

stop + ing = stopping

flap + ed = flapped

begin + ing = beginning

But

counsel + ing = counseling

despair + ed = despaired

delight + ful = delightful

So the rule: double the final consonant before a suffix with a vowel if a single vowel precedes the consonant or the consonant ends a one-syllable word or a word with an accented final syllable.

Where to go from here...

There are many more rules to govern spelling and just as many exceptions to the rules. So do you have to just memorize the rules? (that would be deadly dull, so find other ways to improve your spelling)

You can:

Look in spelling books or on the Internet for ways to improve your spelling.

Play Scrabble with someone that can spell well (use a Scrabble dictionary, too).

Check over your work for spelling mistakes. If you create documents on the computer, do not rely on spell check.

Do not settle for spelling mistakes in your work. If you make a mistake, look up the correct spelling (or ask someone) and write the correct word out. Use the correct word in a sentence, or challenge yourself to use it in a sentence before the end of the day.

Challenge yourself to spell the commonly misspelled words, either by yourself or with a friend.
